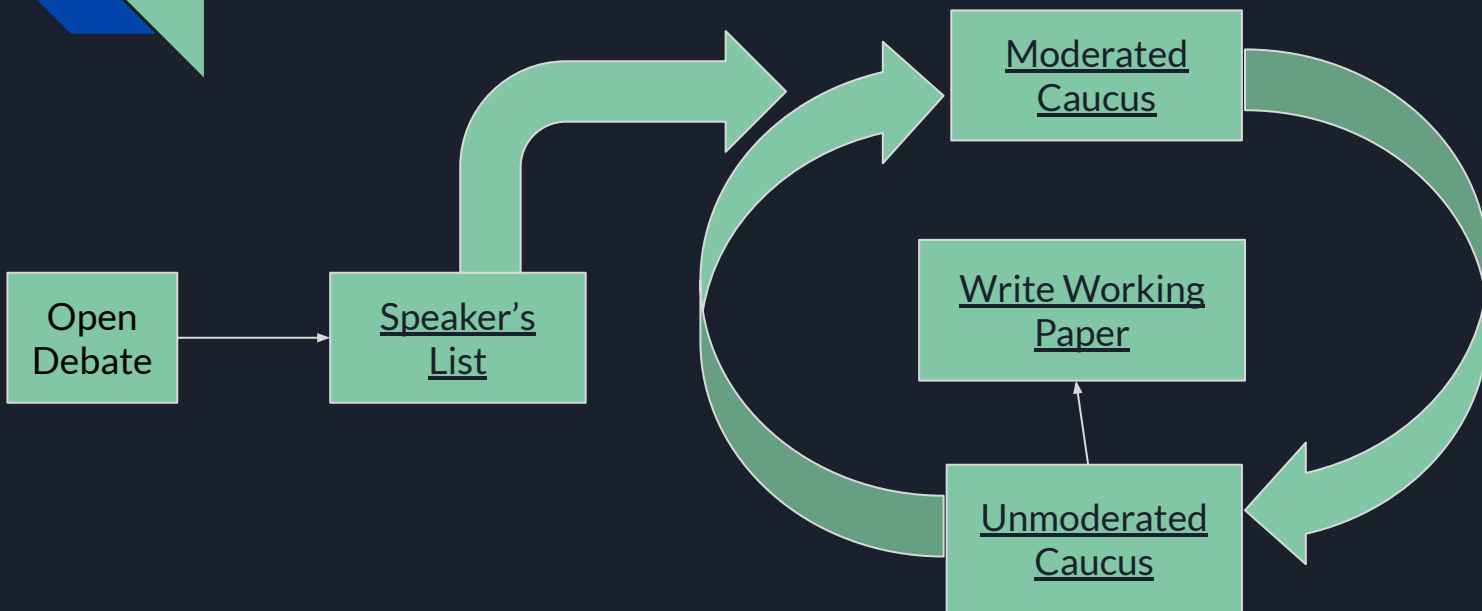




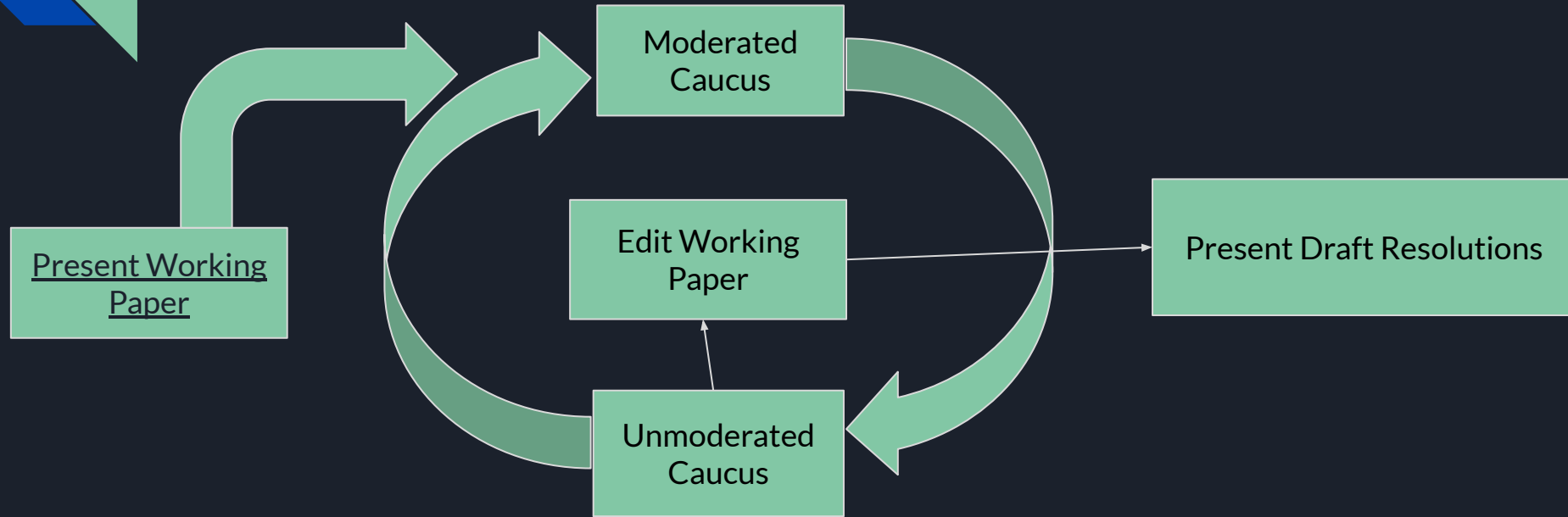
# Flow of Debate

## Phase 1: Introductions and open debate

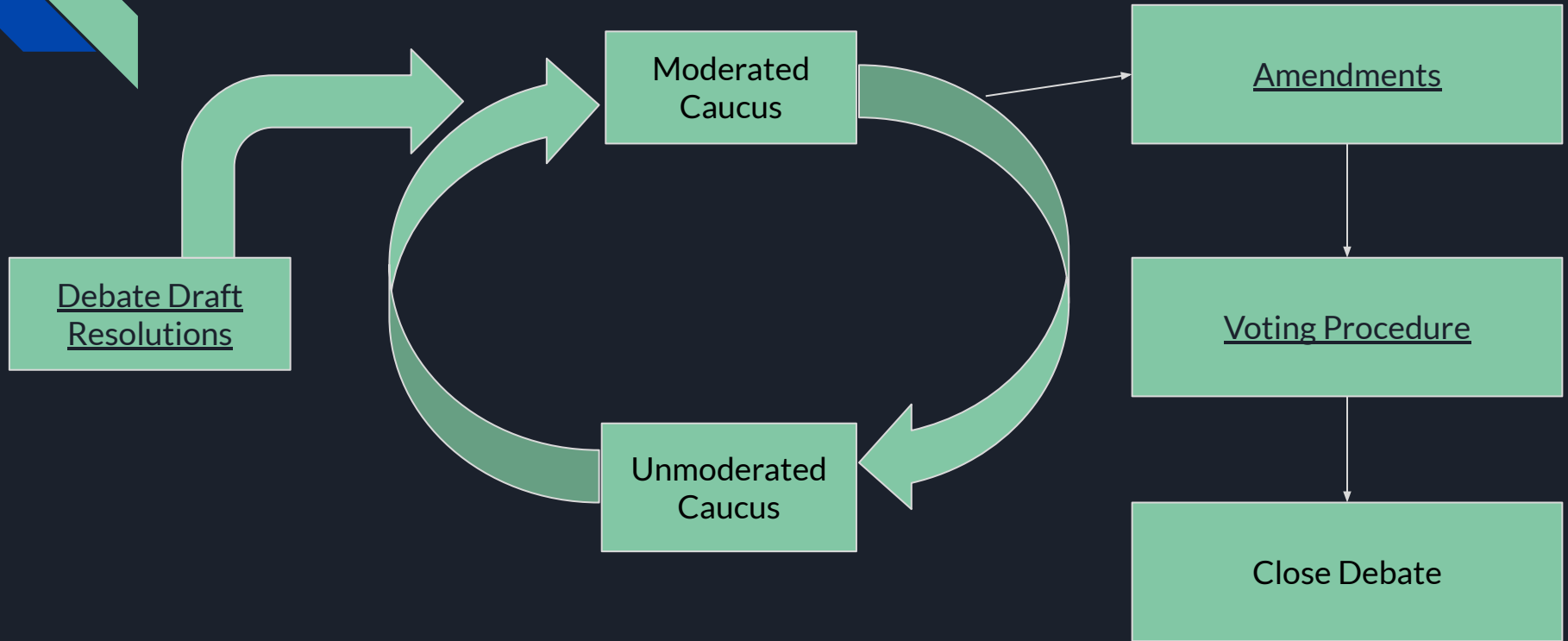
- All underlined items are hyperlinked to other documents with more in depth information



## Phase 2: Resolution Writing

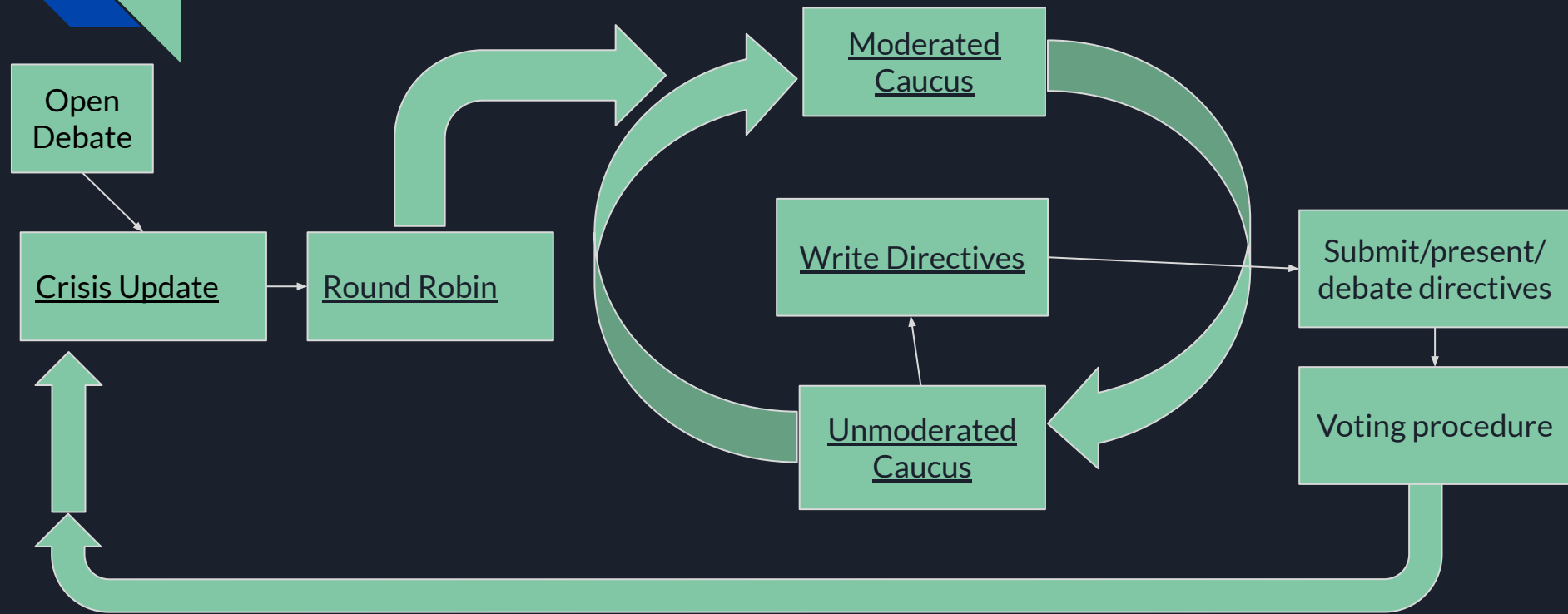


### Phase 3: Finalization of Resolutions, debate, and closure

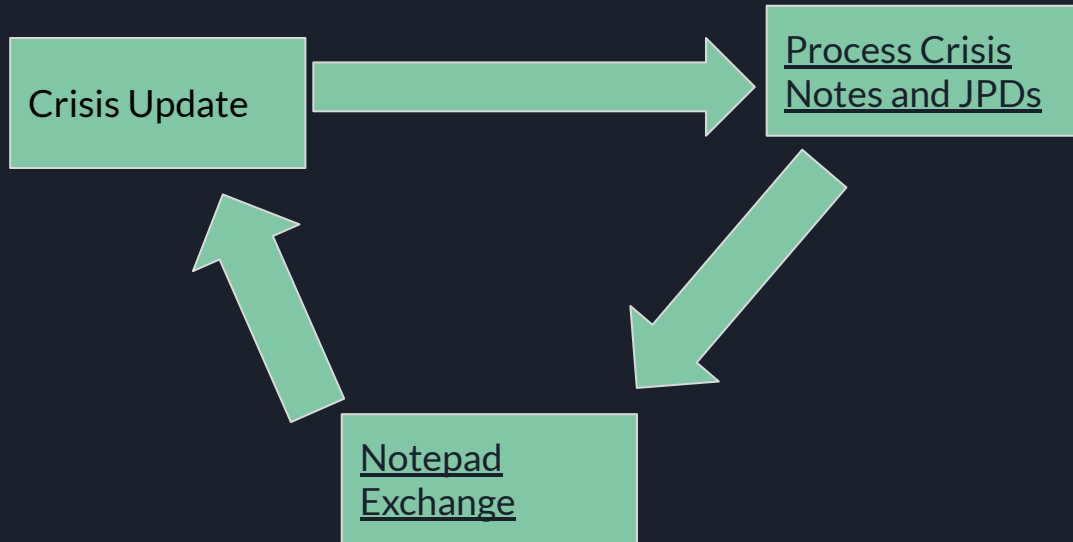


## Crisis Front Room

# Notes

- Committee flow is controlled by delegate motions and time is regulated by the chairs. Your conference may execute the different elements of this guide in a different sequence. This is a general guide based on our experience to help you get started.

- When working in a double delegation an “in-room/out-room procedure will usually be implemented where after the first few rounds of moderated caucuses, one delegate from each delegation will go into the “out-room” (usually the hallway outside the committee room) to work on working papers/draft resolutions on their own. Front room delegates can join their partner in the back room during unmoderated caucuses.
  - Sometimes delegates switch off between in-room/out-room but usually focus on in-room if their strength is speaking or out-room if their strength is delegating and writing
  - It is up to chairs discretion when and how often they want to implement in-room/out-room
  - It might be wise to utilize a point of inquiry to ask the chairs to explain their procedure on this at the very start of committee if you are unsure about anything.
